Revelation 15:1-8 Study Guide

Read Revelation 15:1-8

1. The first verse says John saw “great and amazing things”. What are some of the things he saw here? How would seeing some of these things have encouraged him? How can they be an encouragement to us today?

2. What was the significance behind the “song of Moses” and the “song of the Lamb”? How do those songs speak to what Jesus has done for us? What are some practical ways we can show our gratitude for what Jesus has done on our behalf?

3. In verse 6 we see that the angels that come from the sanctuary are clothed in garments that reflect purity and holiness. Why is it imperative that as believers we live lives of purity and holiness? What’s the result when we don’t? How will you ensure that you live in purity and holiness and so bring God glory with your life (be practical and specific here)?

4. Verse 8 concludes with the awesome glory and majesty of God Almighty. Pastor Dave often says, “Our theology dictates our behavior.” What does that mean? What would a big view of God look like lived out in your daily life?
